Survey of 600 voters in the 2020 or 2022 general election

Field dates: March 23-27, 2023

To the best of your knowledge, is it legal or illegal for public school teachers in Massachusetts to go on strike? **ROTATE ORDER.**

Right now, it is illegal for public sector employees, including public school teachers, to go on strike in Massachusetts. Teachers' unions who do go on strike are subject to fines. There is proposed legislation that would make it legal for teachers to go on strike. Governor Maura Healey has said that she does not support giving teachers the right to strike, saying that after years of remote learning during COVID it's "paramount that our kids be in school." About the poll

These results are based on a survey of 600 Massachusetts voters who voted in either the 2020 or 2022 general elections, or who registered to vote since December 1, 2020. The sample includes an oversample of 122 Boston voters. Responses were collected via online survey interviewing between March 23 and March 27, 2023, using conventional registration-based sampling procedures. The data were weighted to reflect known and estimated population parameters for voters statewide and in Boston. Groups were then combined and weighted to the population parameters by race, age and gender, education, geography, and party registration for voters statewide. The margin of error for the entire sample is +/- 4.8 percentage points for the entire sample, including the design effect. This project was sponsored by Democrats for Education Reform.
